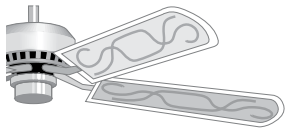

Your ceiling fan shouldn't stay idle all winter. Check your fan for a small switch that allows you to reverse the fan's spin. Running the fan clockwise on the slowest speed produces a small updraft that forces warm air down from the ceiling. You'll be able to set your thermostat lower and stay comfortable for less. ■

Is that shiny new gym membership card still in your wallet unused? While you contemplate hitting the treadmill, consider making a resolution that will literally change the world. Conserving energy can help cut harmful emissions, reduce the need for building future power plants, protect natural resources and save you money.

Here are a few small resolutions you can make with your family:

- Start with the simple things: draft stoppers for your doors, extra blankets for your bed and socks and slippers for your whole family can help everyone feel more comfortable without turning up the thermostat. Every degree you turn up the heat adds to your heating bill.
- If you're going on vacation, turn the water heater down. Otherwise, you'll be paying to reheat the same water over and over when you're not using it.
- Run the dishwasher only when it's fully loaded to avoid wasting hot water. Also, check your dishwasher's owner's manual for any special energy-saving features.



- Clean your refrigerator's coils this month – slide it away from the wall and use a vacuum cleaner or soft brush.
- Turn off your computer when you aren't using it. Left running day after day, the typical PC could cost \$75 per year in energy.
- Your laundry system can help you save energy if you avoid overloading. Too many clothes in the washer means they don't get fully clean, while too many clothes in the dryer require an extended drying time. Also, cleaning the lint from the dryer filter after every load helps protect the machine's efficiency.

Smart use of gift cards



If you're planning to take advantage of post-holiday sales, purchasing ENERGY STAR® qualified appliances can help dramatically reduce your utility bills. Look for the blue, rectangular ENERGY STAR sticker to help you choose products that exceed U.S. Department of Energy guidelines. Wondering why you can't find an ENERGY STAR qualified dryer? Because most clothes dryers use similar amounts of energy, ENERGY STAR does not label dryers. Yet you can reduce the amount of energy you use drying clothes. Air-dry clothes whenever possible, select a high-spin option on your washer to extract more water before clothes go in the dryer, and if your dryer has a moisture sensor, use it to automatically shut off the machine when clothes are dry. ■

Getting your ducts in a row

Keeping your home's ductwork operating at peak performance will help keep you comfortable and your heating costs under control. As the ducts deliver air to your furnace to be filtered and warmed, and then disperse the heated air through your home, little leaks and dirty air filters can cause your central heating system to work harder than it should. **Here's how to avoid wasting energy and money:**

- Replace your furnace's air filter, preferably once a month. Dirty filters reduce air flow, so the system has to work harder to deliver air to the registers.

- Check the duct surfaces where the metal sections meet: if you can see the duct seams, seal the joints with UL-181 foil tape or duct mastic.
- Removing the register covers in your rooms may reveal a gap between the duct and the drywall where heated air is escaping into the walls. Use foil tape or duct mastic to cover this gap, as well.

Finally, if your furnace is at least 15 years old, you may want to consider investing in a new ENERGY STAR® qualified system. Its superior energy efficiency can help you reduce heating expenses year after year. ■
